but did not ban its consumption banned the production, transporting and sale of alcoholic liquor What was it? introduced by the Volstead Act 💿 The Eighteenth Amendment to the US Constitution ratified in January 1919 Politicians agreed with them...to get more votes. Many small towns and women's organisations campaigned against alcohol Alcohol was blamed for breaking up families, causing unemployment, ill health and suffering for women and children The Anti-Saloon League, and the Women's Christian Temperance Union Why was it introduced? supported Prohibition Brewing was traditionally run by German immigrants. Campaigners claimed that it would be patriotic to close down their industry **Prohibition in the USA** Speakeasies arose, which sold alcohol behind closed doors. Moonshine or hooch was illegally made alcohol, which could be lethal Bootlegging was smuggling alcohol into the USA from Canada or the West Indies Made ordinary people into criminals **Effects** Police were reluctant to enforce the law, and were open to bribes Gangsters stepped in to supply the demand 🕒 and fought to control the business and made a fortune 😑 Led to a big increase in organised crime so the local police would take no action. It was not working 

Some states repealed their own legislation The Depression meant that there was less money to spare to catch smugglers Why was it repealed in 1933? Roosevelt (became President in 1933) personally disapproved of prohibition.
